

10,001 notch up perfect score in 24 PU subjects

Centums Rise Big Time After Last Year's Dip

Bengaluru: The number of centum scorers in the secondyear PU exams has taken a huge leap from 6,243 last year to 10,001. The number of subjects in which students have scored 100% marks has risen too—from 22 in 2014 to 24 (out

of a total of 34). The were 11,000 centums in 2014.

Despite the paper leak and confusion surrounding the chemistry paper, 1,280 students have scored 100% in the subject, beating last year's 966. Centums in physics have

plunged from 482 last year to 45. The number of students scoring full marks in business studies has dipped from 2,007 last year to 1,997. The number has also fallen for statistics (1,031 to 583) and computer science (895 to 583). Math centums have gone up from 1,067 last year to 1,519. In accountancy, centums have more than doubled: from 741 last year to 1,585.

Pass percentage drops, girls top in all streams

The overall pass percentage has dropped from 60.54 last year to 57.2 this year. Among girls, 64.74% have passed (68.24% last year). They have topped in all streams. The pass percentage among boys continues to be in the fifties: 50.2, down from 53.9 in 2015. Dakshina Kannada and Udupi districts continue to hold the top two positions with a pass percentage of 90.48 and 90.35, respectively. Yadgir district is at the bottom. P2

Said her mother Pankaja Raman, "We were shocked and weren't expecting it at all. She would refuse to attend any family function and soned most of her time with

The student of VVS Sardar Patel PU College, Bassveshwaranagar, scored a total of 596 out of 600, with 97 in English and 99 in Sanskrit. "I had always wanted to pursue pure sciences and now I'm this close to achieving it. My parents did not place any restrictions on me, and were worried about me! But I would read novels and talk to friends when I needed a break," said Rakshitz.

Pass percentage dips 3.34; 92 colleges record nil result

Bengaluru: Two question paper leaks and a load of tension for students. Results of the II PU examinations saw a 3% dip this year, with an overall pass percentage of 57.20% as compared to 60.54% last year. Though Science students were under tremendous pressure as the chemistry question paper leaked twice and the exam was scheduled thrice, the pass percentage in this paper is 83.31%.

And it was girls all the way. The toppers in Science, Commerce and Ariswere girls from Bengaluru, Vijayapura and Ballari. Rakshita T of VVS Sardar Patel PU College, Bengaluru, scored 596 out of 600 in Science, Sahana Kulkarni from Vijayapura scored 594 in Commerce and P Anitha from Ballari got 585 in the Aris stream.

respectively. Kodagu, which was in fourth slot, scaled up to third place this year and Uttara Kannada slipped from third place to fourth. Yadgir came in last in an exam attempted by 6,36,368 students.

The state has last seen a pass percentage of 57.03 in 2012, after which it has been steadily rising, but it dipped again this year. Only nine times in the past 39 years have the II PU results have recorded a pass percentage of 50 and above. Across the state, 92 colleges recorded 0% results, which include one aided, two government, one bifurcated and the remaining unaided colleges.

Last year, the pass percentage of boys was 53.9, and has decreased this year to 50.2. Even girls have slipped: from 68.24% in 2015, it is 64.78% this year.

Defending the decrease in overall pass percentage, primary and secondary education minister Kimmane Ratnakar said 25,000 more students registered for the exams compared to last year, and grace marks were not given in any subject. Last year, students were given 21 grace marks.

The pass percentage in urban and rural areas has also declined this year. In 2015, the pass percentage was 60.23% and it fell to 57.36 this year, in rural areas, it was 61.52% in 2015 and this year it is 56.66%.

The number of debarred students came down to 74 compared to last year's 104. Compared to last year's 104. Compared to last year, the pass percentage in Arts fell to 42.12% (51.12% in 2015) and in the Comparere stream to 64.16%, (70.8% in 2015). However, the Science pass percentage scaled up from 65.19% to 66.25%.
